




The case of the **Awash River** Basin: high level of economic development concentrated around the use of limited water resources.

- Unclear mandates;
- Lack of resources;
- Lack of monitoring and information sharing for planning.




Growing costs for urban consumers: pollution and treatment costs drive prices up: increasing instances of scarcity – interrupted supply. Especially the poorest lose out.









Cost of production compared with average tariff rate for domestic consumers.
