

Background: NRC in Jordan

- Independent humanitarian organization helping people forced to flee
- Assisted more than 68 million people worldwide in 2016
- In Jordan in 2016, NRC reached 134,895 people with services like shelter, education and ICLA in and outside of camps
- Relieving the impact on host communities
- Emergency response in a developing context: Linking humanitarian relief and development work





Context

- 236,304 registered school-aged
 Syrian children (2015-2016) in Jordan
- Creation of 198 double shift schools
- Increasing wear and tear in overcrowded schools
- Rehabilitation and construction of new classrooms in urban areas, including the expansion of WASH facilities (UNICEF-funded project)

- 8. Support to enroll and retain students














Assessments

Action Plan

- Developed based on the individual school needs assessment
- Considering minimum standards (as defined in adapted Three Star Approach for WinS in Jordan)
- integrated into annual School
 Development Plan for submission to DoE






Toolkits

Most problems can be traced back to:

- Lack of clarification on roles and responsibilities
- Lack of knowledge and skills or inappropriate behavior
- Lack of planning
- Lack of materials and equipment

However, an effective toolkit can enable school the community to address these through:

- Clarifying roles and responsibilities
- Strengthening responsibility and positive hygiene behavior (preventing vandalism)
- Institutionalizing cleaning and maintenance with planning tools
- Ensuring that necessary consumables are available





Requirements for Scaling up

- Final evaluation after initial implementation
- MoE sign-off and roll-out
- Phasing-out of NRC school focal points: Handover to MoE (training of trainers)
- Identification of champion schools
- Arabic translation with learning incorporated
- Budgeting at national and regional level





Success Factors

- Developed within holistic approach of NRC intervention
- Based on proven approaches and experiences from other countries
- Adaptation to Jordanian context
- Designed for participatory identification of individual schools' needs
- Mobilization of available resources and integration into existing structures
- Scalability considered from the start
