

When individual toilets are not enough

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Types of Shared Sanitation

strictly controlled for small number of HHs

users: few residential families location: residential

why: money, tenure, space unavailable for IHHT

for example: family/landlord compounds, dense communities, apartments anyone in any HH can go before work or school

users: many residential neighbors location: residential community why: money, tenure, space or

<u>conditions</u> preclude full IHHT coverage for example: slums, dense informal neighborhoods, periurban settlements

community

anyone away from home or office

users: commuters, worshippers, workers

location: parks, stations, religious centers, markets


why: not at home when nature calls

for example: slums, dense informal neighborhoods, periurban settlements

Shared Sanitation in Practice












In urban areas, individual behavior reveals barriers to Citywide Inclusive Sanitation

Key sector challenges

- Operation and maintenance
- Monitoring and evaluation
- Access for all meeting the needs of women, people with disabilities, the elderly, etc.
- Complementary water supply and hygiene facilities
- Land tenure insecurity


What are the **minimum requirements** for urban shared sanitation to be of high quality?
