- \*Sri Lanka -multiple and parallel extreme climate related events
- \*Living laboratory for disasters

- \*Droughts in the North, floods in the South and landslides in between
- \*Need to move from a dependence on a post disaster response to risk reduction





\*Women in Sri Lanka 51%

\*High literacy but low political participation,

\*Poor access to information and decision making related to NRM

\*DRR and Dependency syndrome - Every one loves a good drought -P Sainath

\*Insufficient gender desegregated data so No information No Action

\* Whose responsibility? state agencies? A partnership of civil society and private sector?

\*Ground level programs focused on building resilience through information, capacity building and adaptation of community wisdom.

- Hands-on capacity building programs grassroots level women leaders in the water sector
- However handover issues the lack of access to state agencies extension , low financing for district level organizations



- \*Sri Lanka Water Partnership and Hatton National Bank
- \*Site specific ground level interventions
- \*Illicit logging heightening the threat of future landslides
- \*Lack of awareness of CC impacts
- \*Citizen science programs in Aranayake after Samasara landslide



- \*Promotion of gender sensitive SDG policy moving from the stratospheric to worms eye view
- \* Policy level initiatives lacking in a gendered approach, local realities, ground level issues and traditional knowledge marginalized
- \*Global documentation related to gender and climate change - HLPF and VNR
- \*National need to push for gender desegregated data



- \*Women led collective initiative ( NetWwater, Centre for Women Research(CENWOR), women water professionals from all sectors with support from Sri Lanka Water Partnership, )
- \*Review of climate related challenges and documentation December 2017
- \*Development of a shadow document highlighting ground realities countering "Paradise on Paper "?



- \*Supportive environment building up gender desegregated data and gender sensitive initiatives
- \*Right to Information (RTI) Act in 2016
- \*Open Data platform being developed
- \*Need for a catalyctic collaboration of stakeholders
