

Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) is a government agency working on behalf of the Swedish parliament and government, with the mission to reduce poverty in the world.

Sida works according to the directives of the Swedish Parliament and Government.

- Close to 700 employees located in three offices in Sweden and posted abroad in our partner countries.
- 2015 budget approx 30 billion kronors (approx. US\$3.5 billion)







Extrabudgetary agreement with UNESCO

Agreement period 2014-2017 total 400 MSEK (≈ US\$47 million)

- Education Sector
- Communication and Information Sector
- Science Sector
- Culture Sector

280 MSEK (≈ US\$33 million)

62 MSEK (≈ US\$7.3 million) 38 MSEK (≈ US\$4.5 million) 19 MSEK (≈ US\$2.2 million)

Sida's thematic priorities

Water is included in one of one of three thematic priorities at Sida:

- environment and climate change
- gender equality
- human rights and democracy

There are 13 Thematic Networks at Sida of which water is one.

They are a forum for exchange of ideas and to disseminate knowledge across units and departments at Sida and the field offices.



Sida's support to the water sector

Sida's support to the water sector focuses on two main areas:

- Water supply, sanitation, hygiene and waste management
 - improving access to services
 - setting up municipal services
- > Water resource management
 - sustainable, accountable and equitable management regimes
 - conflict prevention

Amounted to approx 5% of Sida's total disbursements (2013)

Essential and vital to achieving: poverty reduction, inclusive growth, public health, food-security, lives of dignity for women, children, and men, balance in ecosystems.





Swedish support has contributed to the instalment of 900 ecological dry toilets in the La Paz region which has made the women in the project area to feel more secure.

"Before one had to look around the river for empty places, behind walls. We women we were afraid, but it was the only option because most people didn't have bathrooms and had to go to the river. Now with the bathroom it's safer and easier." Isabel, living in El Alto

Example of results Sweden has contributed to

KENYA Water Sector Programme



- More than 156,000 people gained access to increased water and sanitation services, through the completion of 42 water and sanitation projects at a village level
- 80% of the surveyed women indicated that water availability at the household level has increased
- 75% of the women noted that the incidence of diarrhea has decreased as a result of increased awareness of the importance of hygiene and the increased water supply
- Water Resource Management Authority had increased revenues, 44% above target





WATER AND GENDER

IN AFRICA, 20% OF THE WORK OF GATHERING WATER AND WOOD IS DONE BY WOMEN

Women and girls often spend up to 6 HOURS every day fetching water

With the same access to productive resources as men, including water, women could increase yields on their farms by 20–30% and lift 150 million people out of hunger





Reducing the distance to a water source from 30 to 15 min increased girls' school attendance by 12% according to a study in Tanzania

Involving women can increase the effectiveness water projects 6 to 7 times
